Christmas Parade & Tree Lighting





Good-Bye to Familiar Faces:

Last memo from Mayor Gorris



After four years as a Councilman and twelve years as Mayor for the City of Gibraltar I have made the difficult decision to retire from office. It has been an honor and privilege to serve the residents of our great city for the past sixteen years. Those years have gone by fast and they have been challenging to say the least. After retiring from a 37-year career in the automobile industry I decided to get involved in local government. I was motivated to help the community move forward with a practical approach to local government while reserving “politics” as a last resort when working with Council and other local officials to make decisions for the community. I have been fortunate to have had the opportunity to work with a group of dedicated council persons who over the years have always put the interest and wellbeing of the city and its residents ahead of their own. Their dedication and support along with the support and encouragement of the citizens of Gibraltar over the years have

been the main reason for my longevity and success in office. My goal has always been to move Gibraltar forward with change that is necessary but fits within the unique character of our wonderful little town and I believe we’ve done that over the past sixteen years.

Over those years we’ve resolved many issues unique to the city and made a number of changes all while staying financially sound during very challenging times. Some significant changes have been upgrades to the Gil Talbert Community Center, the addition of the Cooke Community Center, its grounds and the addition of the Boblo Pavilion to park grounds. A skate park and kayak launch were also added recreational opportunities. We also were able to put the abandoned Countywide landfill on the National Priorities List for ultimate remediation by the EPA and we helped Ferragon Corporation with the renovation and repurposing of the old McLouth Steel plant. With the residents’ renewal of a dedicated road millage, we reconstructed N. Gibraltar Rd. and sections of Fryer and Bayview streets. Roads that almost all residents’ use. Additionally, we were able to land a MDOT grant to replace the 90-year-old Middle Gibraltar Rd. bridge which will be complete this December. We have also worked over the years with the Detroit River International Wildlife Refuge on a variety of items that included completion of a bike and pedestrian path along Jefferson from Middle Gibraltar to Vreeland. These are some of the more significant changes. There were many other accomplishments too numerous to mention.

These accomplishments are not mine alone. They have been achieved through the hard work, cooperation and diligence of City Council to make timely and appropriate decisions on the community’s behalf. This has also been made possible by the hard work, cooperation and sacrifices of the City’s employees in City Hall, the DPW, the Police Department, its volunteers on the Fire Department, the Recreation Director, the volunteers on various commissions and its residents.

Thank you all, Residents, City Employees, Council Members and Volunteers for the opportunity to serve and for your support for the last sixteen years!

Gibraltar Infrastructure Millage

This past election, voters passed the Gibraltar Infrastructure Millage. This millage is at the rate of 2.5 mils for 5 years and will take effect on the Summer 2022 tax bill. This millage is a dedicated millage that will be used to repair, replace and maintain our underground infrastructure which will include water, stormwater and wastewater networks.



This is a tandem approach with our water account, as the presented rate increase of \$1.00 per unit will be going into effect for further capital infrastructure funding. As many know, infrastructure all around the county is becoming overwhelmed and is in need of repair.

The City would like to thank you for your proactive and perceptive support by putting your community first and taking the necessary steps to help fix the issues before they become emergencies.

New Trash Service Began September 7th

The City of Gibraltar has signed a new contract with **PRIORITY WASTE** for trash and compost pick-up. An informational introductory mailer from Priority Waste was mailed to your home, outlining all the changes and specifics of our new waste hauler. If you'd like a copy of this mailer please ask City Hall.

Our contract still includes bulk items and yard waste; bulk items are any large items such as bed frames, mattresses and furniture. The garbage company will not pick-up construction materials of any kind. There will also still be a recycling bin located in the City Hall parking lot for self-service recycling.

Priority Waste trucks will operate from **6:00 am – 6:00 pm**. We will still be using the same waste toters as were provided by GFL. Please issue a report to **PriorityWaste.com** or call the Customer Service Line at **586-228-1200** if your trash was missed and for any and all other feedback or issues.

In the event a holiday falls on or before your collection day, your collection day will be moved to the following business day. Priority Waste recognizes the following holidays:



- *New Year's Day*
- *Memorial Day*
- *4th of July – Independence Day*
- *Labor Day*
- *Thanksgiving Day*
- *Christmas Day*

Chipping is done every Wednesday by our DPW (with overflow into Thursday). Tree branches for chipping should be left as long as possible, with the larger end of the branch facing towards the road in a neat, uniform pile. **The chipping service is not for trees cut down/trimmed by a hired contractor.** Small branches and limbs should be placed in yard waste bags.

If your trash can is broken by Priority Waste, please visit City Hall to complete a Garbage Can Claim form. We ask that you fill out the form and include pictures of the broken can if possible. City Hall will submit the claim on your behalf once completed. A copy of the form is also attached to the back of this newsletter.

WATER & SEWER RATE INCREASES

On an annual basis, while going over the next fiscal year budget, water rates are determined. Factors that go into determining the water and sewer rates are:

- Increases imposed by Great Lakes Water Authority
- Increases imposed by SHVUA to treat City Waste Water
- SHVUA cost share adjustments imposed on each member community based on usage
- Equipment Costs (vacator truck, water meter reading software, pumps, etc.)
- Expected Water Usage by the Community
- Water and Sewer Capital Improvement Costs

Sewer rates were last raised in 2014. SHVUA costs have greatly increased over this time. Operating costs alone have increased by approximately 9% per year. Due to this, sewer rates were increased by \$1.66 this past April, for a total rate of **\$13.76** per 1,000 gallons.

Likewise, water rates were increased by \$0.24. An additional \$1.00 will be added on top of this by way of the infrastructure millage which passed November 2nd. This equates to a total of **\$9.28** per 1,000 gallons. This is due to increases imposed by Great Lakes Water Authority as well as an increased cost for Equipment Maintenance and Water Quality Testing.

The total increase will be \$2.90 per 1,000 gallons at a total of **\$23.04**. For a household of two people using on average 10 units of water this is roughly \$40 more per quarter.

As mentioned above, water rates are reviewed annually to determine if they are adequately set to sustain the system. Water and Sewer rates are set accordingly to provide adequate revenues to cover all system expenses and liabilities as well as maintain proper cash reserves necessary to provide a high-level of service to the customer.

REMINDER:

PICK UP YOUR FLOOD EMERGENCY CARD

The city would like to remind residents of the requirement to pick up their “Flood Cards” from the Gibraltar Police Department, if they have not already done so. The Police Station is located within City Hall at 29450 Munro Ave.

This initiative is in response to current high-water issues associated with elevated lake levels. Residents are required to show these cards in their vehicles during flood events in order to gain access to the city. Many long-term residents are familiar with these cards as they were used during previous flood events. Each household is allotted two flood cards and will have numbers that will be assigned to your street address.

The purpose of these cards is to eliminate non-residents from gaining access to the town during flood events. During these events eliminating non-resident traffic is essential to preserving public safety and private property. Checkpoints will exist at the four entrance points to the town. Cards will be able to be hung from your rearview mirror to be highly visible at City Checkpoints to prevent traffic back-ups. For residents who may not have a card, drivers licenses indicating residency can be used to gain access.

Residents of Horse Island will receive a different color card. It is essential that traffic is limited to only Horse Island residents during a flood event.

In preparation of potential flooding, the City has made available sand bags free of charge for interested residents. Bags can be picked up in the vestibule of City Hall.

POLICE and FIRE

Residents are reminded that City policy requires that warning sirens sound during a flood event every hour whenever lake levels reach 72 inches. Testing of the sirens is performed every last Wednesday of the month at or around 10:00 a.m.

CITY HALL GENERAL INFORMATION

Tax Bill Information (2021/2022)

Summer 2021 taxes were due without penalty **August 31st**. If you have not yet paid your Summer 2021 taxes, there is now a (one time) 4% penalty added to your base amount. This amount will be payable through **February 28, 2022**.

Winter 2021 taxes will be mailed out **December 1st** and will be due without penalty by **February 14, 2022**. If you have an escrow account with your mortgage company, a tax bill will be sent to them and you will not receive one. If you believe you should receive a tax bill and did not get one, please call City Hall at 734-676-3900.


*** As of March 1, 2021 all unpaid 2020 real property taxes have been marked delinquent and are only payable with the Wayne County Treasurer's Office. You can view and pay delinquent property taxes at pta.waynecounty.com/ or by calling (313) 224-5990. Personal property and Meadowlands taxes are always payable at City Hall and do not get sent to Wayne County.*

Water Department

The Gibraltar Water Department runs on a quarterly basis. Water bills are read via a handheld computer that electronically collects reads which are uploaded to a program. Bills are generated and mailed in the months of **January, April, July and October**. The bills are always due the 10th of the following month. If you do not receive a bill, contact City Hall for a duplicate to be mailed to you.

After the due date, a 10% penalty will be added to whatever is owed on your account. Council has adopted a policy that mandates water accounts be paid to a zero balance by the start of the next billing cycle. Thus, the Water Department adheres to a shut-off schedule which allows residents to pay down their water bills in incremental stages. Should you have questions in regards to our adopted shut-off schedule, contact Chelsea Johnson in the Water Department at 734-676-3900.

It is important that you pay close attention to the usage portion of your water bill to determine abnormalities. Water bills are billed a flat rate of \$22.04 per unit of water (1,000 gallons), so if your bill has gone up, so has your usage. The average person uses 5 units of water a quarter (ex. a household of four people should be around 20 units). If your bill seems high, checking for leaks is always a good first step. Toilets often run intermittently and have "silent" leaks. Place food dye in the tank of your toilet and if the coloring runs to the bowl, then that is an indicator that that your toilet is running. Another good trick is to check your water meter reading (by shining a flashlight on the face of the meter) and waiting a few hours without any water use and reading again. If the read has changed even slightly, then a leak is probably occurring.

Drop Box

The City Hall payment drop box is located in the traffic island across from the flag pole. Water and tax payments may be dropped for payment if you are unable to make it to City Hall during normal business hours. The drop box is checked daily. **If you forget to make a payment for water or taxes on the date it is due, anything that is in the box by 8:00am the following day will be considered as on time.**

There is a United States Postal Service mail box located in front of the Gil Talbert Community Center.

Watershed Information

Storm drains found in our streets and yards empty into our lakes and rivers. When we fertilize our lawn we could also be fertilizing our lakes and rivers. While fertilizer is good for our lawn, it's bad for our water. Fertilizer in our lakes and rivers causes algae to grow. Algae can form large blooms and use oxygen that fish need to survive. With 1.5 million homes in Southeast Michigan, all of us need to be aware of the cumulative effects of our lawn care practices.

Here are seven simple steps you can take in your home and yard to protect our lakes and streams.

- 1. Help keep pollution out of storm drains.** Storm drains lead directly to our lakes and streams. Never dump oil, pet waste, leaves, dirty water, or anything down a storm drain. Remember, only rain in the drain.
- 2. Fertilize carefully and sparingly.** Excess fertilizer that gets into storm drains pollutes our lakes by causing large algae blooms and using up oxygen fish need to survive. Sweep excess fertilizer back onto your lawn, use a low or no phosphorus fertilizer, and have your soil tested to see what, if any, fertilizer is needed.
- 3. Carefully store and dispose of household cleaners, chemicals, and oil.** Instead of putting hazardous products like antifreeze, motor oil, and pesticides in the trash, down the storm drain, or on the ground, take them to a local hazardous waste collection day.
- 4. Clean up after your pet.** Whether on a walk or in your yard, promptly clean up after your pet. Not only will be you a good neighbor, you will also protect our water from harmful bacteria.
- 5. Practice good car care.** Consider taking your car to a car wash or washing your car on the grass.

6. **Choose earth friendly landscaping.** Protect your pets, kids, and the environment by using pesticides sparingly. Also, water your lawn only when it needs it and choose plants native to Michigan.
7. **Save water.** Over watering our lawns can easily carry pollution to the storm drains and to our lakes and streams. Consider using a broom instead of a hose to clean sidewalks and driveways. Direct hoses and sprinklers on the lawn, not the driveway. This will help save our lakes and streams and save you money.
